A Perfect Pavilion for Pondering Preschoolers

After celebrating our 60th anniversary throughout the past year, we began the new year grateful for all that we had accomplished. With everything that has happened throughout the last few difficult years, we have looked for ways we could continue to support

our growing community and mission of education. After completing two major projects in 2021(the new aviary for our injured raptors, and the preservation of Pfister's Pond) we were excited to be able to successfully complete a new education pavilion as well!

Constructed on the site of the old TNC aviary, this new structure will provide a covered space for our young Forest Preschool friends to take respite from rain or other forms of inclement weather without having to come inside the small Visitors'

Center. This 20'x16'x10' pavilion has open sides, a rain catch barrel, and a professionally installed raised foundation to prevent flooding.

Over the past decade, the nature center has seen an increase of 5-20% annually in programming requests. Due to this increase and the more recent demand for outdoor activities and opportunities brought on by the pandemic, TNC has been looking for ways to upgrade its outdoor classroom spaces. With our mission of preservation in mind, our staff want to ensure that any additions or alterations will not overly disturb the natural environment, maintaining a healthy

> stewardship of the property. In addition to our Forest Preschool, this pavilion may host scout groups, family programs, adult lectures and birthday parties. In the summer and school breaks, this new structure now provides a permanent base for our Pre-K & Kindergarten level (Chipmunks) of our Nature Day Camp!

> As we think about our future, we hope to continue upgrading our education spaces and provide visitors and program participants with better and more modern facilities that meet

the needs and accessibility of our current day and age.

A Forest for Field Trips

Over the past two years, as the COVID-19 pandemic forced schools to change their daily routines, teachers and districts were left scrambling to figure out ways to accommodate their students by providing necessary education content from afar. As teachers and administrators focused on their new need to provide lessons virtually. some learning traditions, such as field trips, were dropped entirely from the 2020-2021 school year. With school shifted from traditional



attendance at a school building to attendance via the internet, families and schools were working to find alternate online education opportunities to fill the void left by a loss of field trips and hands-on

education.

Tenafly Nature Center worked quickly to find solutions to help community schools during this time, ensuring that important environmental learning opportunities could still occur. This meant TNC's Environmental Educators had to alter our large variety of programming into a more remote friendly format. While providing these programs, staff utilized theatrical performance techniques to successfully engage

students in virtual field trips that were engaging and engrossing.

Having those virtual opportunities has connected TNC to many schools who otherwise wouldn't have had access. However, remote learning was only a temporary solution and could never replace the hands-on, interactive learning that many students require.

Environmental education promotes problem-solving techniques by encouraging students to research and inquire 'how and why?' specific things happen, leading them to make their own decisions about complex issues. These connections enable students to apply their learning in the real world. By strengthening critical and creative thinking skills, environmental education motivates a new generation to be the upstanding leaders of the future.

Prior to COVID, TNC taught over 23.000 students on an annual basis. School buses carrying 4 classes of eager students ready to begin the day's lesson was a common daily occurrence

This spring, field trips are back on the agenda as pandemic restrictions continue to ease up. "TNC's busiest season is upon us and it is so good to see that things are slowly resuming back to normal. I was exuberant to see a yellow school bus chugging its way up Hudson Ave! It feels like it has been forever ago." exclaimed Anna





Sills, TNC's Field Trip and TNC to Go Manager. "Students have been isolated and cooped up inside, it feels so right giving them access to good quality education while outdoors to help support vital development."

Although other organizations may be ready to jump right back into the swing of things as if COVID never happened, TNC is taking the cautious approach. "The safety of staff and students is paramount," says Sills "and we plan on keeping that way." Each outdoor classroom provides plenty of space for students to spread out while learning. In the event of rain, there is a covered pavilion for shelter.

In addition to teaching on-site, TNC travels to schools and brings elements from our living museum for in-class programs, such as Lives of the Lenape and Animal Adaptations. A Truth of Cryptids - New H.S. Program

HIGH SCHOOLERS INVESTIGATE THE NATURAL WORLD FOR SIGNS OF THE "SUPERNATURAL"

Mothman, Sasquatch, Nessie and, Jackalopes. These "creatures", among others, have enthralled and inspired for generations. While definitive answers may never be found, the search for cryptids continues to draw eager explorers, journalists, and citizen scientists.

Tenafly Nature Center's new program for high school students, Truth & Cryptids, will enable participants to experience the rigors of investigating cryptids for themselves. As they begin their investigation of the cryptids of TNC, program participants will be working together to generate content for a news outlet of their own creation. In teams, participants will research animals that could be confused for one of several new cryptids, using a

blend of journalism, science communication, biological survey and research.

As journalists, student teams will learn the basics of rhetoric and scientific inquiry to decide what counts as plausible evidence for the existence of their cryptid. As citizen scientists, they will survey local wildlife and create hypotheses about their creature. As artists, students will flex their creativity making evidence of their own. These aspiring journalists will then have the opportunity to present their findings to the public at the end of the program.

Each team will focus their investigation on one as-yet-unknown cryptid, as well as one or two major groups of known animals. While teams gain a greater understanding and appreciation of extant creatures; they will also build the mythos of

their own cryptid.

Teams will work together on their long term goals by sharing and presenting their results to other teams for discussion. By the end of the session, each participant will have a firm understanding of basic biological survey and journalistic principles, as well as a portfolio of articles and other media. Along the way, participants will have the opportunity to interview and interact with experts and other notable locals as they try to track down truth & cryptids.

Truth & Cryptids (T&C)



7 sessions Mondays, March 28; April 4, 18, 25; May 2, 9, 16 Saturday, May 21-Presentation Day (Optional) 4:00-6:00 pm

Strange sightings of mysterious creatures have been cropping up around the Tenafly Nature Center. Are these simple misidentifications or some kind of Jersey Devil? Your independent source for science and nature news, Truth & Cryptids, aims to investigate the claims. Is seeing really believing? There's only one way to find out!

In this unique, new program, participants will research animals that could be confused for a chosen cryptid using a blend of journalism, science communication, biological survey and research. As journalists, student teams will learn the basics of rhetoric and scientific inquiry to decide what counts as plausible evidence for the existence of their cryptid. As citizen scientists, they will survey local wildlife and create hypotheses about their creature. As artists, students will flex their creativity making evidence of their own, as yet undescribed, cryptid. These aspiring journalists will then have the opportunity to present their findings to the public at the end of the program, Saturday, May 21.

This program will focus on emergent learning in a projectbased style. While participants will have goals each week, how they achieve those goals will be up to their individual teams. Teams will also be encouraged to work together on their long-term goals by sharing and presenting their results to other teams for discussion. By the end of the session, each participant will have a firm understanding of basic biological survey and journalistic principles, as well as a portfolio of articles and other media. Along the way, participants will have the opportunity to interview and interact with experts and other notable locals as they try to track down truth and cryptids.
