Help us protect Tenafly Nature Center

- Stay on trails at all times and stay out of streams and ponds (to minimize disturbance to plants & wildlife).
- Trails are for foot traffic only. **No bicycles** (or any vehicles) beyond the parking area.
- No dogs or pets leashed, carried, or otherwise.
- Do not release any animals.
- Please do not disturb, feed, collect or remove wildlife plants or animals or other objects (ex. mushrooms, rocks, soil, leaves, acorns, ferns).
- Smoking is not permitted anywhere on the premises, including vapor from an electronic smoking device.
- No fires (without staff oversight).
- Leave No Trace Carry-In, Carry-Out. Please no littering.

Please Note

- Tenafly Nature Center is open to the public seven days a week, year-round. Visitors are welcome to enjoy a hike along our 7+ miles of trails between dawn and dusk. For your safety, you must be off the property by dusk.
- Currently there is a nominal admission fee for nonmembers: \$2/person or \$10/family (up to 6 people). This admission is in effect between the hours 9:30 am -4:30 pm daily. Visitors may bring cash or there are QR codes available for the use of digital payments.
- Groups of 10 or more are asked to contact us in advance.
- Professional photography and filming requires a permit. For more information see TenaflyNC.org/Photography-**Filming**
- Be sure to visit the Visitor Center building (Nature Center Building on the map). Open Daily from 9:30 - 4:30 pm.

Points of Interest

- Redfield Building (Visitor Center): Visit this red building north of the parking lot to learn more about our programs, read a book in our library, observe our Animal Ambassadors, or relax and let your children play with nature/science based toys. Adjacent to the building is our Bird Feeding Station, Butterfly and Pollinator Garden, and Birds of Prey Aviary.
- Main Trail: Continues along the line of Hudson Ave, intersecting with several other trails, and offers great views of Pfister's Pond.
- Yellow trail: Features a seasonal Storywalk[®], loops from the Main Trail and leads to the floating dock, giving you a different view of Pfister's pond.
- Red Trail: Home of the Bellflower Faerie Trail, loops south of the visitors center and offers a selection of wildflowers in the spring.
- Haring Rock Trail: See Haring Rock, a glacial erratic boulder named after Dr. John J. Haring, who made house calls in the area circa 1900.
- White Trail (DeFilippi Trail): Follows the east shore of Pfister's Pond and features a wildlife watching shelter.
- Bischoff Trail: Visit the lagoon a vernal pool that provides a breeding area for frogs and amphibians in the spring.

Understanding Trail Markers

CONTINUE STRAIGHT	START OF TRAIL	RIGHT TURN
SPUR LEADING TO A DIFFERENT TRAIL	END OF TRAIL	LEFT TURN
